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Chairman's Report

A very warm welcome to everybody attending this very different AGM. Meeting on Zoom has become the "new normal" for the committee in these strange, Covid 19 times, and we will do our best to run the AGM as best we can under these conditions. We miss the traditional gathering at the High Commission.

Over the past year His Excellency Mr. Muyeba Chikonde departed and I would like to thank him for his hospitality and encouragement during his tenure as High Commissioner, and wish him well in his new role. We welcome the new High Commissioner, His Excellency Lt Gen Paul Mihova and look forward to working with him and his team at the High Commission. We very much value the help and support of the Deputy High Commissioner, Mrs. Patricia Chanda.

Many thanks to all members of ZST for your continued support, which enables us to continue funding all of the projects that are described in this report. I was very encouraged by the generous response to our special appeal in April, when it became clear that fundraising activities would be curtailed due to the virus. I am also delighted to report that we have received further significant donations during the year which enable us to maintain our regular commitment to all of the projects. In spite of the restrictions Andy Rose was able to run the Harrogate Golf Day (the tenth) and it turned out to be the best ever, thanks to the generosity of participants.

As in UK, schools and colleges in Zambia have been closed for several months, but thankfully they opened again in September. These closures have caused much hardship, and there is not much opportunity for internet based learning. I'm glad that the schools that we support have done their best to continue providing lunches for children where they can, as these are much needed. I am full of admiration for all of the leaders of all the projects for their selfless care and devotion to the young people that they serve.

I am grateful to all committee members for their enthusiastic commitment and wisdom, and for giving their time as volunteers. We are able to keep in touch with every project to give encouragement to the leaders and to ensure that all funding is well used. I am pleased to report that David Nicholls has agreed to join as a Trustee. David has been actively involved with ZST for many years and has raised significant funds through sponsored marathons around the world - including Antarctic and South Africa.

Mathias Mbewe has moved back to Zambia to establish a farm, but he will continue as an overseas member of the committee through the use of Zoom and other means. He will act as a link between the committee and membership here in the UK and our work and membership in Zambia, and will keep in regular contact with the projects.

Sadly, our President James Cairns has decided to stand down this year. His long and distinguished service as Chairman, Vice President and President is very much valued, and his wide ranging knowledge and experience will be much missed.

We have asked Jane Mundy to share with us her experience in helping to establish "Destination Livingstone", a project to encourage the growth of tourism in Livingstone Town. Tourism is an important industry for Zambia, and, sadly, has been severely impacted by the pandemic, so all efforts to attract more visitors are to be welcomed.

Report of the Trustees for the year ended 30 June 2020

The Trustees of The Zambia Society Trust ("the Trust") present their annual report and accounts of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2020. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in Note 1 to the accounts.

In setting our objectives and planning our activities the Trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. The Trust is devoted to the relief of poverty, disability and sickness, and to the promotion of good health and advancement of education. In allocating funds in line with the Trust's Objects, the Trustees make a considered assessment of the benefits to the specific beneficiaries and to Zambian society as a whole. The Trust monitors on an on-going basis all projects to which it gives support.

Education Grants: £20,000

The Trust as part of its remit supports young people in Zambia who need financial assistance to continue their educational studies. The increase in applications for education grants for 2020 shows that we are becoming better known in Zambia.

Over 70 applications were received by the Lusaka branch of the Education Committee, who forwarded 24 names. A final selection of 22 was made after consideration by the U.K. Education Committee of the Trust based on the funds available. Grants were also made available for the 8 students who had been selected the year before and needed a second year of funding. This made a total of 30 young people who may not have been able to attend their studies without our support.

As an organisation we have been trying to ensure that girls get an equal chance for further education. In 2020 we have been able to support 12 female and 10 male students with new grants and 5 women and 3 men from the previous year.

Help for Orphans and Other Vulnerable Children: £15,000

Kwasha Mukwenu (Help Your Neighbour), Matero, Lusaka: £6,000

The Kwasha Mukwenu Ladies group, founded in 1991, has a total number of 194 orphaned and underprivileged children in its care; 106 girls and 88 boys.

The original goal was to educate at least one child in a family of orphaned or under-privileged children in the hope that this child would then be able to support other siblings. Support from the group then expanded to provide lunch for families where impoverished grandparents were unable to cope. Fund raising is an ongoing struggle and some of the, elderly, ladies work as cleaners in a local brewery in order to create additional income. They also make and sell baking products and door mats.

The Trust, as with all the projects we support, is in regular contact with the Kwasha Mukwenu Ladies and we recently received the following report from them:

"The 2019 grant received from ZST was used chiefly to purchase text books, pens and flip charts for the children's use and to fund two teachers. Secondary school fees for all the relevant children were also paid. Due to the outbreak of Covid-19, pressure from the Ministry of Health meant that we had to paint the premises and follow strict guidelines to allow us to continue to operate. Unfortunately, at this present time we are not able to fund the purchase of face masks for the children.

Going forward we face many challenges. Our priority is to continue to provide education and food for our children, and to fund our two teachers. We have a lack of computers which would enhance the learning opportunities for the children, and we are aware that our ladies need younger woman to assist with the project. Another aim is to provide food for the ladies who are often on site all day, but do not have a meal themselves."

Mpunde Mission Centre, Central Province: £3,000



Fr. Adam who runs the Mpunde Mission Orphan Project provided the following report to the Trust:

"On behalf of our vulnerable children, orphans and the entire Mpunde community and above all on my own behalf, I want to thank you most sincerely for your generous donation.



In this difficult time of the COVID pandemic, a significant part of the donation was allocated to support 200 children and teachers at Mpunde/ Kapandula Day Secondary School. Through your contribution, we bought for them personal hygiene products (bathing and washing soap), powdered drinks, biscuits and sugar. Thanks to your help, children have been protected against the possibility of being infected with COVID.

The another segment of the donation was dedicated to paying school fess for talented children from poor families or orphans. Your contribution allows us to support 39 pupils in various schools, colleges and university. In total 239 of teenagers benefited this year from your donation.

My dear friends and benefactors, your economic and spiritual encouragement through the years has been greatly influential in improving the living conditions in our region. We are very grateful for your help and assure you of our thankfulness and prayers. I humbly plead you to continue helping our vulnerable children and orphans.


Chitsime Association, St Lawrence, Home of Hope, Lusaka: £3,000

This is a community-based project comprising: St Lawrence School, St Lawrence Home of Hope, Special Needs School, home-based care programme and a computer centre. The Trust supports the work undertaken at the Home of Hope, which is supervised by Br. Jacek and we received the following report from him:

"This year was very different from any other we were living through. The whole World had to adapt to the new reality of life with pandemic. We were very scared as well, listening to the news from around the Globe. Seeing giant economies struggling to protect and help their citizens, we were terrified with possible devastating impact, this pandemic would have on our people in Zambia. After 7 months we can say that so far, we have been incredibly lucky, as the gloomy scenarios did not realize. Yes, the prices for many commodities went up, but we are healthy. Till now Zambia had not seen significant rates of infections and deaths due to COVID. Our daily life is largely going on as usual and w hope it will continue this way. The most challenging time for our home was the time when all schools were closed and children who are learning in boarding schools had to return to Home of Hope. For more than three months we were struggling with almost 100 children at home. It was "crazy" time, considering that we have only 55 beds at our disposal, but we got through it quite well. Schools have since reopened, 24 kids went back to their schools, and we are back to 74 boys in the facility

This is also the first year for the Home of Hope to be on our own, since from the beginning of this year the Catholic Women's League decided to leave our partnership. It is the first time in our 22 years history we can monitor and evaluate more accurately the whole complexity of running a large project like our home. We have started this year with ZMW 218,000, carried forward from the previous year, which included the donation from Zambia Society Trust for 2020. During this year so far, we have received ZMW 1,107,000 from many friends and donors: from the USA, UK, Poland, Nederland, Germany, Australia, and Zambia (Total on our disposal = ZMW 1,325,000). From 1st January till the middle of October, we have incurred expenses to the total amount of ZMW 1,035,000. Statistics show that we spend an average of ZMW 41.00 per person per day. ZMW 9.50 pp/pd is spent on food and groceries.





From the beginning of this year till 30th October, we have admitted 71 new boys. This has increased the monthly average intake from 6 to 7 new children per month. We can estimate that we will close this year with about 85 new children. We have managed so far, to "trace" families of 57 children. For the remaining 12 boys, for whom contact with the family was not yet established, 4 are from DRC, 2 are from Ethiopia, and the remaining 6 are from Zambia. We have, however, managed to reunite with their families a total of 37 boys. Two weeks ago, 11 of our boys have passed their proficiency assessment test and qualified to resume their education in 7th Grade. They will join their friends in boarding school in January 2021. Unfortunately, few days after this great achievement, one of those boys, 14 years old Clement, has been diagnosed with rheumatic heart disease. He will need a heart surgery and will remain on heart medication for the rest of his life. For this reason, he will not be able to follow his friends, but instead, will continue his education, if his health allows it, in the nearby school.

We feel truly encouraged by the fact that the importance of the service we provide and the work we do on a daily basis is being recognized. We are grateful to you, the Zambia Society Trust, and many others, for choosing to become friends of our neglected, homeless, abused and lost children by deciding to support our efforts in providing service to many of the most vulnerable members of our Society.

Together we can do more. Together we can do better.

St Francis Hospital, Katete AIDS Orphans Project: £3,000

The Orphans and Vulnerable Children ("OVC") project was one of the first to be established in Zambia, starting in the early 1990s in response to the sudden onset of HIV/AIDS that led to early deaths of many, especially been 20 - 50 year olds in the late 1980s, leaving an increasing number of orphans.

The advantages of the scheme are that the adopted children are cared for by members of their extended families, so do not lose contact with their relatives and culture.

It is much less expensive than establishing Western-style orphanages, which cost per child as much as the wage of a labourer.

The children are helped by the Trust to attend school by paying for primary school costs, such as exercise books, ballpoint pens, soap for washing clothes and a contribution towards their clothing.

Textbooks are shared between 20 – 30 children. Each village has a guardian who oversees the children/ families. The guardian is also responsible to the team based at the St Francis Hospital who visit each village regularly - three times each year. There are about 60 villages. Access to the villages can be difficult. The picture opposite illustrates this.

Initially, 2,000 children were accepted into the scheme. This was gradually reduced to about 1,000 children, due to insufficient funding. Currently the OVC program is looking after 1,300 children at a cost of about £18,000 each year.

In recent years, several of the beneficiaries within the OVC project have achieved high marks at Grade 12 and have found Registered Nurse and Midwifery training places at St Francis 'Nurse Training School. We have been able to find outside sponsors to pay for their training and are very grateful for the help received.

The Friends of St Francis Katete is very grateful for the financial assistance provided by individuals mainly in the UK, The Zambia Society Trust and the Old Catholic Church in Bonn, Germany.

The aim is to give these young Zambians a real chance in their lives and hopefully to give something back to their communities.

Footballs and Netballs: £2,000

This project has now been in operation for 15 years and we continue to provide balls to Zambia Open Community Schools, who receive the majority of the balls, and to Katete Hospital and Katete Girls Secondary School who receive a small number.

With great regret we learnt in August that the leader of ZOCS, Harriet Sianjbu Miyato, had died aged 69. For many years she had worked as an education specialist with the Ministry of Education and then she pioneered ZOCS to provide quality education to disadvantaged children, especially in remote areas. Under her leadership ZOCS supports 3,000 community schools covering 600,000 children.

As in previous years, the footballs and netballs are manufactured by Alive and Kicking in Lusaka. Unfortunately with coronavirus balls cannot be distributed at the moment. ZOCS have collected their allocation from Alive and Kicking but can only distribute them to their schools once restrictions are lifted. The same applied to Katete and hospital staff will collect from Lusaka only when allowed.

APTERS (Appropriate Paper Technology) Group: £2,000

It is more than 10 years since the Trust began supporting the work of Apters-Zambia through the Apters Support Group ("ASG"). ASG helps the very poorest parents pay for the mobility aids their children need. Every Wednesday 10 to 15 children come to the clinic to be measured for the chairs, standing frames rollers or wedges. Existing items can be remade to fit as the children grow. Over the past year the Trust's grant paid for more than 270 such items, including:

- 60 Special chairs with trays
- 50 Standing frames
- 30 Wedges
- ❖ 30 Rollers
- 30 Walking frames
- 20 Corner seats
- ❖ 50 Puzzles & Teaching aids

Kenny Habaalu has been the director of APTERS since its

beginning and earlier this year he reported on the successful completion of further renovations to their building in the grounds of the University Teaching Hospital in Lusaka.

The Covid-19 pandemic has had a marked impact on the APTERS team and on their work. From March onwards the number of children attending each clinic for assessment and fitting has dropped by between 10% and 35%. Income generated from the craft market ceased when it closed. As an alternative means of fundraising parents and some of the children have been involved in the making of face masks and have helped with the production of table linen for a hotel.

Growing Communities: £2,000

This project, which began about eight years ago, involves the creation of a village to provide a range of essential resources for very needy, widespread local villagers in Kalilanama in Serenje District. The project village has now reached a stage of maturity with four core elements now up and running i.e. school, church, agriculture, and health post. The leadership team comprises Grace Sholoma (nurse), Jastin Sholoma (farm manager), Evans Mubanga (head teacher) and Nicholas Kambilombilo (engineer).



The school has been functioning well, with over sixty pupils, (roughly equal numbers of boys and girls) with two young teachers and plans for a second classroom when funds are available. The curriculum includes life skills such as sewing and gardening as well as literacy, numeracy, and other subjects. Sports days are popular with children and parents and there is an active parent-teacher group.

All schools in Zambia have been closed over the past few months, due to the Covid crisis, but reopened in September with special measures in place.

Church meetings are held in the school each week and there is also an afternoon adult literacy programme with 15 adults - 13 women and 2 men.

The agricultural work is progressing well, under Jastin's management, and villagers are working together, learning improved methods for growing a wider range of crops. Maize, soya bean and millet are being grown in the fields and egg plants, bananas, tomatoes, rape, carrots and sweet potatoes in the irrigated vegetable garden. An orchard has been started with eucalyptus, lemon, guava and passion fruit. Some field crops have been badly affected by floods, followed by drought conditions, but they are hopeful that overall there will be an acceptable harvest. Thanks to generous donations from supporters, the project is about to buy a decent tractor and plough which will enable them significantly to expand their productivity. Pigs and guinea fowl have recently been introduced.

A Health Post was completed in February, to Government specifications, with Grace in charge, and well over 500 people have attended so far. The local Chief, Chief Kabamba, is very supportive and the Government is supplying some medicines.

It is very encouraging to hear that local villagers are starting to share in leadership responsibilities for the project, which they see as the "village of hope" serving their community.

Finance

The financial result for the Trust shows an overall income of £49,318 and, after deducting administrative expenses of £4,214 and charitable expenditure of £41,118, a net surplus of £3,986.

In these uncertain times the Trust has ended its financial year in a strong financial position with cash reserves at the balance sheet date of £52,465. During the early stage of the UK lockdown the outcome for the year looked very different; the ability to maintain our current level of charitable expenditure was very much in doubt. Decisive action by the Trustees resulted in a general appeal by our Chairman. The appeal was successful and generated donations of over £4,000 and indirectly led to a significant donation of £10,000. The Trust is now in a position where it can maintain its current level of charitable expenditure in the next financial year. In addition we are able to carry forward £10,000 of cash reserves to insulate the Trust against a material shortfall in income during the next financial year.

The Trust is well supported by a wide range and number of donors. During the year we received donations ranging from £10 to £10,000 from 56 donors; all are very much appreciated.

Donations

Donors can request that their donation be allocated to a specific designated fund such as the Orphan Fund or Education Fund or any other of our project funds, or donations can be allocated to the Unrestricted General Fund to be used as determined by the trustees.

Management and administration expenditure

Management and administration expenditure of £4,214 represents 46% of our membership subscription income; consequently, all donation income is expended entirely on our charitable projects.

During the year the Trust upgraded the website to incorporate an online payment platform; membership subscriptions and donations can now be made by credit card. We are already receiving donations and lapsed membership subscriptions via this method of payment which is very encouraging.
